LESSON 7: LIFE CALLING AND THE POWER OF PURPOSE

INTRODUCTION

This lesson is part of a Discipleship Essentials module titled Leadership Lifestyle. The lessons examine the practical and spiritual requirements for those in Christian leadership. Being a leader is so much more than standing up in front of a group of people asking them to follow you! To be a great leader, one must maintain high standards in both public and private life. While every one of us struggles in many ways, a leader faces unique challenges. This module identifies some of these struggles and how to combat them, with practical advice from men and women who have experienced the trials and joys of following God's calling in leadership. Each lesson concludes with a Leader to Leader page. It features quotes from historical Christians, current Christian leaders, and people (not in leadership) who share their perspective on the topic.

INTENDED AUDIENCE

The intended audience for these lessons is Christians who are maturing in their faith and desiring to serve God. The lessons will be especially helpful to those who are pastors, church leaders, mentors or teachers, but also anyone wishing to grow in their relationship with God.

The Leader's Guide is intended to help you as a leader in your preparation. These lesson outlines may be used in conjunction with other Discipleship Essentials materials found online at www.discipleshipessentials.org.

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LEADERSHIP LIFESTYLE

LESSON 7: LIFE CALLING AND THE POWER OF PURPOSE

PURPOSE

This lesson explores the general and specific callings from God, and how we can discern our purpose in the world.

LEADER'S NOTE

Many of us in leadership have faced a moment when we wished God would just appear to us and give us a specific mission, as He did with Moses at the burning bush! But the event was recorded in the Bible because of its spectacular nature – not because it is the way God typically reveals His plans. Discerning God's calling can be stressful and confusing, but at the same time exciting, and can give a powerful sense of purpose and direction. It may be several years after faithfully serving God that He will guide us into some specific task. It is important to seek God and His direction and look for the ways He directs and speaks to us. This may come in many forms. If you are comfortable, share with your participants any specific calling you have felt, and the way in which God unfolded His plans for you!

INTRODUCTION

Select two or three of the following questions to ask the group.

- ❖ Do you know anyone who has been called by God to a specific ministry? How does this calling impact how they feel about their work, or how they conduct themselves?
- ❖ Have you ever wished you could have more clarity about what God wants you to do with your life?
- ❖ Is there some task you hope God never calls you to do? Which would be more difficult for you – to leave your home and family and work as a missionary in another land, or work a secular job at home, knowing God wants you to serve Him there?
- ❖ What is God's purpose for all people? Do you believe God has a specific purpose for you in addition to this general purpose?
- ❖ What do you do when you want to know God's will about something specific? Has this ever been a struggle in your life?



STUDY

Instruct the group on the following points.

TEACH:

- ❖ **What is a Calling?** When Christians speak of having a calling, they are referring to being directed by God to serve in a specific ministry. Many individual Christians struggle with the question of what God is calling them to do with their lives, recognizing that we are all suited and designed for different types of work in God's Kingdom. While individuals may begin to question these things in young adulthood, the question is never really resolved, and that is a good thing! God's call on our lives may be different in different stages of life. Each of us is called by God to obey His general commands to everyone, and also His specific direction to us as individuals.
 - **General Call:** The mission or purpose of every Christian is found in three general callings from God. They are:
 - **Salvation:** Each of us is called to respond to God's offer of salvation by repenting of our sins, believing in the work and person of Jesus Christ, and acknowledging Him as Lord of our life (Acts 2:38, Acts 3:19, John 3:16).
 - **Sanctification:** Each of us is called to obedience and holy living. God's commands are universal; none of us is exempt from them. This work of sanctification is only possible through the enablement of the Holy Spirit (2 Timothy 2:21, 1 Thessalonians 4:3-7, Hebrews 13:20-21).
 - **Service:** Each of us is called to serve God in some way. When opportunities present themselves, we should respond positively and obey Him. It may be a temporary opportunity rather than a life calling. If we are not serving in any way, we are not responding to the general call of God on our life (James 1:22, Ephesians 6:7, Romans 12:11).
 - **Specific Call:** God's specific call to us may involve the way we are to serve Him, and could include a full-time vocation. It is often separate from what we do to earn a living, though in some cases the two may overlap. A person could receive a call to be an evangelist but operate machinery by day. Or a person may be paid by a church to be their full-time pastor.
 - **Given by God, Confirmed by Others:** A specific calling on our life may come in different ways: a deep burden or passion, a constant spiritual pull, clear direction through His Word, a dream, or through the admonition of other Christians. These calls are usually confirmed by others who recognize that God has gifted and equipped the individual for the task.
 - **Many Vocations:** The word 'vocation' has come to mean work or mission given to us by God. There are many types of vocations. The farmer and the preacher may equally be called by God to their work. There are opportunities to serve God in many ways and in many places!



- **Family:** marriage, parenthood and care of children within a family are callings of God.
 - **Workplace:** working in a regular job, and serving God through it, is a calling. We may be called to serve people as a medical doctor or teacher. Being a good employer or employee is also a calling of God.
 - **Culture:** finding our unique God-designed mission within our culture is a calling. We may be called to politics, to govern, to create culture through art or music, and in these ways bear witness to God in the world.
 - **Church:** we may also be called to serve God specifically in full-time or part-time ministry as a pastor, missionary, evangelist, or some other area of service. In many cases, Christians have a regular ‘day job’ in addition to their spiritual vocation. In other instances, people are paid for full-time ministry.
- o **Our Calling Glorifies God:** When we discern a call from God to a specific work or mission, we should take the necessary steps to follow His direction. It may take our whole lives to achieve what God has designed for us, but as we work out our calling and vocation, God is honoured and His work is accomplished.

TASK:

Divide participants into groups of 3-5. Give each group one set of verses below. More than one group may work on the same verses, but ensure all verses are covered. As they read them, they should identify whether they are referring to a general call for all believers, or a specific call for an individual. Once each group has discussed them, have them share what they have learned about the general call on all believers to serve God. You may wish to make a list on chart paper or a blackboard.

**TEACH:**

- ❖ **God Calls Imperfect People for His Perfect Plan:** Sometimes we feel we are not ready to take on leadership, or to really effectively lead others to God. There may be flaws in our own character, and weaknesses in our life. But the interesting thing is that God doesn't use perfect people. God calls imperfect people who will rely on Him.
 - **His Power is Made Perfect:** God does not always call those who are powerful, wealthy, influential and wise. He often uses the most ordinary and the weakest among us! It is God's power at work in us that accomplishes anything good! Otherwise, there is no witness to the world of God's power. Consider these verses:
 - o [2 Corinthians 12:9-10](#)
 - o [1 Corinthians 1:26-31](#)
 - o [James 4:6](#)
 - This is excellent news for all of us! God does not have to wait until we are ready, fully trained, completely equipped and experienced! God will use us right where we are, and will give us His ability and power where we are lacking.
 - God is carrying out His perfect plan in this world, and we are ALL called to join Him in it, each in our own unique way. We are not perfect, but we are part of His perfect plan which brings glory to Him.
- ❖ **God's Calling and Reassurance:** The Bible is full of stories of individuals called by God for a unique purpose, and equipped to carry out that task. Most were reluctant, a few were enthusiastic, but all who responded to God's call were imperfect people. There are four men who received God's calling, but who were hesitant at first.
 - **Moses:** God heard the cries of His people in slavery, and called Moses to act on His behalf. When Moses was given his specific call, he already had a burden for his enslaved people and had acted to defend them. God had been working in the life of Moses all along to prepare him for this great work. Moses never felt that he was the right man for the job – but God used Him anyway.
 - o **Invitation:** God appears to Moses in a burning bush and gets his attention. God invites Him to come closer ([Exodus 3:1-6](#)).
 - o **Commission:** God tells Moses he will be sent to deliver his people from the hand of Pharaoh in Egypt ([Exodus 3:10](#)).
 - o **Objection:** Moses objects to God's plans and asks, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh?" Moses did not seek out this position, and was intimidated by the greatness of the task. Moses felt he was not a good enough speaker, and even begs God to send someone else instead! ([Exodus 3:11](#), [Exodus 4:10,13](#)).
 - o **Reassurance:** God responds to the objection with reassurance and the offer of help. God reminds Moses that He will be with him, and that his brother Aaron will speak for him. God gives Moses signs ([Exodus 3:12](#), [Exodus 4:11-12, 16](#)).
 - o **Acceptance:** Moses obeyed the call of God and returned to Egypt ([Exodus 4:20](#)).



- **Gideon:** Gideon was the fifth judge over Israel at a time when God's people had abandoned the worship of God and were living in sin. As the people called out for God to rescue them, God used Gideon to answer their cries and deliver them from their enemies, the Midianites.
 - **Invitation:** God speaks to Gideon through the angel of the Lord while Gideon worked. Gideon questions the angel about all that has happened (Judges 6:11-13).
 - **Commission:** The angel tells Gideon to go and save Israel from the hand of their enemies (Judges 6:14).
 - **Objection:** Gideon responds by asking how he could possibly save his people. His clan is the weakest, he is the least in his father's house (Judges 6:15).
 - **Reassurance:** God promises that He will be with Gideon, and that together they will successfully take down the enemies. Gideon is still not convinced that it is truly the voice of God speaking, so asks Him for clear confirmation. When God works a miraculous sign for Gideon, he is reassured (Judges 6:17-24).
 - **Acceptance:** Gideon begins to serve God by removing the idols his family worshipped and setting up an altar to God (Judges 6:25-27).

- **Zechariah:** God had a plan for His faithful servant, Zechariah, to be the father of John the Baptist. Zechariah was an old man when this was revealed to him, but his years of faithful service to God had prepared him. Even though he was old, he was still useful in God's sight. It was an important calling to be the father of the forerunner of Jesus Christ!
 - **Invitation:** The angel Gabriel appears to Zechariah while he is performing his duties as a priest (Luke 1:5-12).
 - **Commission:** The angel tells Zechariah not to fear. He is told he will bear a son (John the Baptist), an important man set apart to prepare the world for Jesus' coming (Luke 1:13-17).
 - **Objection:** Zechariah wants to know for sure whether this will come to pass. He is sceptical, because he and his wife are passed child-bearing age (Luke 1:18).
 - **Reassurance:** The angel reassures Zechariah that he is a messenger from God. A sign is given to him; because he doubted, he would be unable to speak until the child was named (Luke 1:19-20).
 - **Acceptance:** Zechariah finishes his duty and goes home to his wife. She conceives a son, and when he is born, they name him John. Zechariah praises God when his speech returns, knowing God has fulfilled His promise (Luke 1:23-24).

- **Simon Peter:** Jesus called His disciples to leave behind their old lives and follow Him. He required their complete trust, and demonstrated His power and authority to them. For three years He prepared them for the high calling of starting the Church and spreading the Gospel to the world!
 - **Invitation:** Jesus ran out of room on the shore as he was teaching people, so he climbed into Simon's boat and set out for the lake (Luke 5:1-3).



- o **Commission:** Jesus commanded Simon Peter to put the boat out into deep water and let down his nets (Luke 5:4).
 - o **Objection:** Simon was skeptical because he had been fishing all night. They were finished for the day, he had washed out his nets, and he was tired. He said, "Master, we toiled all night and took nothing" (Luke 5:5).
 - o **Reassurance:** Jesus demonstrated His power and caused the nets to be full of fish. Simon Peter was astonished and responded with a feeling of unworthiness. Jesus told Simon to not be afraid, and that his calling now was to 'catch people' and bring them into His Kingdom (Luke 5:6-10).
 - o **Acceptance:** When the boat got back to the shore, Simon Peter left everything he had and followed Jesus (Luke 5:11)
- Think about these four stories. God repeated the same process over and over with many people in the Bible, and He still does with us today. He calls us to join Him in His work and fulfill the purpose for which He made us!

ASK:

Does all of this sound familiar to you? Have you ever been assigned a task that seems bigger than you are, or more than you could possibly handle?

What can you learn about God's call and enablement from these Biblical examples?

What difference did it make for these men, knowing that God had called them to a specific task and that He would be with them?

TEACH:

- ❖ **Characteristics of People with a Call:** When people know what their mission and purpose in life is, many things change. Nothing is meaningless anymore. When you have a call from God, you should become:
 - **Servant Hearted:** You begin to see clearly the needs of people around you and the ways in which you can serve them.
 - **Focused:** You begin to say 'yes' to what fulfills your purpose, and 'no' to the things that distract you. Focus allows you to make better choices in all areas of life.
 - **Passionate:** You become a person who is passionate about the work of God and what He is doing in the world. You have energy and determination to complete the task.
 - **Inspirational:** As you follow God's leading in your life, you inspire others to do the same. You attract others to serve as they observe God working through you.
- ❖ **How to Know your Calling:** One of the biggest questions people ask is how they can know God's calling! That is an excellent but sometimes complex question. A good starting point is to do what you can in serving while you wait for God's call to be clear.



➤ **What You Should Know:**

- **Know the Bible:** 2 Timothy 2:15 tells us to study our Bible carefully in order to be adequately equipped to serve God. Time spent studying God's Word is never wasted. Knowing God's truth will prepare us to share His Word with others.
- **Know your Gifts:** Pay attention to the gifts others confirm in your life and practise using them. God's call will be in line with your gifts, not contrary to them.
- **Know the Needs Around You:** Pay attention to what needs to be done and watch for ways to do it. Get to work while you wait for your call!
- **Know what God is Doing in the World:** Read about missionaries, Christian workers, pastors and evangelists to increase your awareness of worldwide Christian ministries. Support others who are doing God's work both locally and in other countries.
- **Know your Burden for Others:** What breaks your heart? What excites you? What do you deeply desire? What fills your thoughts and dreams? These are clues to the work that God wants you to accomplish. He has given you passions, pains and pleasures to point you to His calling.
- **Know the Limitations of your Life Circumstances:** At the present time, you may not be in a position to fulfill God's ultimate call. For example, if you are a young mother, your vocation is to raise your children, but it will not always be so. Consider your current ability to serve God, and also opportunities that will exist in the future.
- **Know the Opportunities Open to You:** Pay attention to opportunities to serve, learn, work with ministry teams, or receive training. If you are invited to serve somewhere, it may be God's call on your life. Pay attention.

➤ **What You Can Do:** While you wait for your call, there are two things we can do: practise and pray.

- **Practise:** God needs us to practise obedience, submission and faithfulness. These are the most important areas of preparation for serving! There may be many callings in our life at different times to different ministries. Each may be an opportunity to practise for something greater down the road. But obedience in small things will equip us for all that is to come.
- **Pray:** Ask God to show you where you need to go, what you need to do, and how you can be part of the work He is doing in the world. Pray that you would have a burden for those who do not know Jesus, and pray that that you would have opportunities to use your skills and gifts. Pray that God would make His calling clear to you.

➤ **How to Discern the Call of God:** A specific calling from God may not come through a burning bush, a dream in the night or an angel visitation. A call from God usually has two parts:



- o **The Inward Call:** God speaks to us through His Holy Spirit, to give us longings, desires and particular holy passions. You will feel a growing commitment to some specific aspect of the work of God, and a compelling desire to be a part of it in some way.
 - o **The External Call:** Often other believers recognize the gifts and abilities of an individual and invite them to a position of spiritual leadership or to a regular secular job. Both vocations have spiritual purpose.

 - o Our calling will usually come through an invitation to serve in some way that matches the deep desires of our heart.

 - o Our calling will usually be confirmed by fellow believers, and be met with encouragement from those who love us, and assurance from God.

 - o Our calling will usually bring a sense of fulfillment and purpose, even if we are not successful as the world measures success.
- ❖ **The Power of Having a Purpose:** A purpose, calling, or vocation is the engine that drives our life. It provides us with meaning, satisfaction and direction. It connects us with the work that God is doing in this world, and every Christian should seek out his or her unique purpose. Even if we are unsure of what God has called us to, we should get involved in serving by taking the opportunities that present themselves to us. Sometimes God reveals His calling after we have served in a particular ministry. A God-centered purpose and calling will bear much fruit and bring deep joy.



DISCUSSION

- ❖ Those who were called by God in the Bible were already working hard, not waiting for God's call! How has God used your past experiences to prepare you for the work He has called you to?
- ❖ What difference would it make to you if an angel appeared and told you exactly what to do with the next week of your life? Would it frustrate you because your plans were interrupted, or bring you great joy?
- ❖ In what ways have you been afraid of the call of God, or doubted His plans for you (like Gideon or Moses)?
- ❖ What could a church do to discern whether someone was called by God to lead them?
- ❖ What has God called you to do? How do you know?

PRAYER

Close the lesson in prayer. Pray that the participants would clearly see and know the call of God, and whole-heartedly embrace it! Thank God that He has given us all wisdom and insight and made known to us the mystery of His will, according to His purpose which He set forth in Christ. Pray that whatever your participants set out to do, they would glorify God and bring many to salvation through Jesus Christ.

"When I was young, I wrote. I didn't think about whether it was my calling. It was just the passion of my heart. I would read and think about how I would have written something differently. At the same time I worried that I would never have anything important to do for God. When I was invited to write about God's Word, I didn't need to pause. It was a calling God had always placed inside me – I just didn't know it until the invitation came! Follow your holy passions, pay attention to what makes you feel alive, and watch for where you feel close to God's work in the world."

"I believe that a personal call to ministry is discerned on two levels: the inner subjective sense of God's call and the external objective call of God's people. I believe, contrary to what I think is the generally held view, that the external objective call is the more important of the two, and that the inner subjective sense of calling should be considered the confirmation of the rightness of answering the external call rather than visa-versa. What I mean is that a person should wait to be actually invited by an actual group of people to become that group's spiritual leader --- and then should prayerfully consider whether God is directing his heart and mind to agree to accept."
